Gabriel's Gifts was founded in March 2000 by Doreen Wise, and was created in honor of her son, Gabriel Lester, who went missing in 1999. His remains were found four months later.



In 2006, Gabriel's Gifts officially changed its name to Texas Center for the Missing (TCM).

IMPACT

Educating the community about internet safety, child abduction, and Alzheimer's wandering prevention



PREPARE

Preparing local law enforcement and other organizations in order to provide a quick response once a missing person is reported




RESPOND

Helping families who are looking for missing loved ones by creating flyers, accessing resources, and providing connections to law enforcement and the media

TCM provides two types of emergency alerts that can be activated to inform the public about endangered missing persons.

Established in 1996 in honor of Amber Hagerman, who was kidnapped and murdered when she was only 9 years old, the Amber Alert has served as a tool to help local law enforcement find abducted children.



Started in December 2005 by an Oklahoma state representative, the Silver Alert is a powerful tool which is used to alert locals about missing persons, specifically elderly individuals who suffer from Alzheimer's disease or dementia.
